## LARRY NASSAR ACCUSERS AND THEIR ATTORNEYS RESPOND TO GUILTY PLEAS ON STATE CRIMINAL CHARGES AND CALL FOR INVESTIGATION OF MSU OFFICIALS.

**WHY:** On November 22, Larry Nassar plead guilty to seven counts of first degree criminal sexual assault in Ingham County, Michigan. Tomorrow he will plead to an additional 13 criminal sexual conduct charges in Eaton County, Michigan.

MSU and its administrators could have prevented the Nassar scandal if they had simply followed Title IX and the mandatory reporting laws. They ignored complaints of his misconduct going back to 1997. When they finally conducted a Title IX investigation of Nassar in 2014, they botched it and allowed him to continue allegedly molesting dozens of women and girls for two more years, including Team USA gymnasts.

According to published reports, MSU has paid the New York law firm

of Skadden, Arps, Slate, Meagher & Flom more than one million dollars to conduct an internal review of the Nassar scandal. The University's refusal to make the results of this review public stands in stark contrast to the actions taken by Penn State University in response to the Jerry Sandusky child sex abuse scandal in 2012.

MSU's refusal to make the facts contained in their secret internal investigation public should not be allowed by a public agency, funded by the taxpayers.

MSU's continuing lack of transparency and cover up of misconduct by University administrators demonstrates the need for an independent and thorough investigation of MSU, its Administration and athletic department.
