WHAT: Women who accused former MSU and USA Gymnastics team doctor Larry Nassar of sexual assault will speak at a meeting at the Michigan State University Board of Trustees.

The women will demand the release of the internal review conducted by MSU's attorneys of "Nassar's former work at the University" and call for an independent investigation of the University by law enforcement agencies.

WHY: Michigan State University repeatedly failed to properly investigate and act upon complaints of misconduct by Larry Nassar going back to the 1990s. Now that he stands convicted of Federal child pornography and State sexual conduct charges, MSU continues to insist that University officials were "fooled by Nassar" and did nothing wrong.

In a letter to Michigan Attorney General Bill Shuette, MSU attorney Patrick Fitzgerald refused to release the results of the University's internal review of Nassar's conduct, insisting that, "...no one else at MSU knew of Nassar's criminal behavior."

A public outcry followed the publication of Fitzgerald's letter. Leading public officials and media have called for the release of MSU's internal review and for an independent investigation of the University.
